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DEMOBILIZ ATION SLOWED DOWN

RAILROAD MEN DELAY CAUSED BY DIFFICULTY CALL STRIKEIN OBTAINING REPLACEMENTS

Washington, D. C. (AMS) - Acting to evert a newly called strike on the Saint way - "Frisco," - President Trumen yesterday named an emergency board to investigate the dispute called for 6:00 (TRT) Saturday. The strike would effect 7,000 workers and halt the roads interstate commerce in states. Twelve grievances are listed, but wages are not an issue. The 3 m a n board will investigge and report within thrity days. In Cleveland, the daily

Dapers, "Mews Press" and "Plain Dealer," are facing a publication halt efter AFL pressmen walked out Saturday morning. They are demanding weekly pay boosts of \$14.64 for the day shift and \$15.54 for the night shift.

In New York, Frank J. of Fitzsimmons, president the Independent Western E1ectric Workers Association, said yesterday that the 3 day old strike by his union against Western Electric was "just about ready explode" into a nation-wide telephone workers walkout.

TROOPS WILL BE EROUGHT BACK AT A RATE OF 300,000 A MONTH

Washington, D. C. (AMS) -- The Army has announ c e d Louis and San Francisco rail that its demobilization program will be slowed down and the rate of return of some troops deleyed because of a difficulty in obtaining replacements for overseas ser vice. Reflecting the Army's apprehension over the dis integration of organized divisions, L/General Joseph L. Collins, War Department Information Chief, declared, "our oversess forces would be dangerously understrength occupying hostile countries if all eligible men were be returned before sufficient replacements arrived."

Collins said that demobilization had progressed to a point where troop requirements overseas, rather than the shipping space, had become the governing factor in rate at which men can be released. At a news conference Collins declared. . . "because troop requirements over sees during the next six months will exceed the rate at which the Army is capable of maintaining them through replacement, it will be necessary to slow down the rate of demobilization and in some cases to delay the return to the United States of mon eligible for discharge until rereplacements can take their places.

"In no case however, should this delay any man in the theaters more than three months beyond the time he becomes eligible for discharge.

According to the International News Service, Collins asked the reporters not to "pin" him down on the length of time, because of complaints -- should it be er then three months. Collins said demobilization which had returned nearly 5,000,000 men and women to civil is n live "will continue with a gradual lowering of the dis charge criteria, until all men who are sligible h a v e been returned from overseas."

Troops will be brought back to the States at a average rate of 300,000 men a month for the next six months, until the Army reaches a planned minimum overseas stren-

gth of 707,000 on the first of July.

CASE AGAINST GERMAN GENERAL STAFF

Nuerenberg, Germany. (ANS) -- As the United States began its case against the German General Staff and High Command, statements by high German military leaders in Friday's war crimes' hearing indicated that plans for aggression had been started as early as 1919. One hundred and fourteen high German military leaders will be affected by the tribunal's decision as to whether the General Staff and High Command was a criminal organization. Moanwhile Hen-rich Himmler - once the dreaded chief of the SS - was pictured Saturday by his former aid as a fumbling coward who "slowly came apart" and spont his last days as a shivering wreck with a vial of poison constantly at his fingertips. The gide - Otto Ohlendorf . said Himmler had once plotted to overthrow Hitler, but had been turned back by his fear of Hermann Goering.
