MANY BOMB HITS MADE IN RAID ON JAPS' KISKA BASE

Enemy Sends Up Only One Plane
To Oppose Aleutian
Attack.

Washington, Feb. 11.—(I. N. S.)—
The navy reported Thursday that
American planes are continuing their
aerial offensive against the Japanese
in the north and south Pacific and
that in an attack on enemy positions
in the Aleutians "many hits" were
scored on enemy installations.

The navy also belatedly confirmed the crushing of all organized Japanese resistance on Guadalcanal but added that "patrol operations against isolated enemy groups continue."

While American planes in the north Pacific were bombing Kiska, the Japanese sent a single float type plane to attack American ships in the western Aleutians but no damage was suffered.

Text of the navy's 277th communique follows:

"North Pacific:

"On Feb. 10:

"During the morning, United States heavy and medium bombers, with fighter escorts, bombed Japanese positions at Kiska. Many hits on enemy installations were observed.

"A single enemy float type plane attacked United States surface units in the western Aleutians. No damage was suffered,

"South Pacific:

"Japanese forces on Guadalcanal island have ceased all organized resistance. Patrol operations against isolated enemy groups continue.

"During the night of Feb. 9-10, a Catalina patrol bomber (Consolidated PBY) attacked enemy positions in Munda.

"On Feb. 10:

"United States planes attacked enemy positions in Munda. Results were not reported.

"A reconnaissance plane from Guadalcanal shot down a twin engine Japanese bomber over Choiseul island."
